


from the ACADEMY ...

This month I requested Alan and Andre to give me an overview at what the club has provided to the Academy members in the way of coaching since November 2016.

From Andre... Session dates and program

November 22nd 2016

Each participant was given an online practice diary we developed to allow them to see how much time they spend in each area of 18 essential core skills required for golf. These skills are: Short putts, Long Putts, X-long putts, Chip shots, Pitch shots, Bunker shots, Lob shots, Rough shots, Buried and long bunker shots, Short wedge shots, Mid wedge shots, Long wedge shots, Short/mid irons, Mid/long/hybrid shots, Fairway wood/driver shots, Course mapping, Course strategy and Course attitude....... There is a lot involved in playing top level golf! They were also given an online statistics program that allows them to track their game and how it is made up. This is from tee shots to recovery shots, to short game to putting. Once the players have this information it is easier for them to target their practice schedule based on their personal strengths and weaknesses.

December 12th 2016

Their practice dairy was updated to now include practicing how to purposely curve the ball from right to left and again from left to right. They marked themselves on their ability to start the ball off in the correct direction and again their ability to curve the ball in the correct direction. Each practice session they had was to be marked into their online diary so we can monitor their progress. Each flight curve was to be done with both driver and 6 iron.


from the ACADEMY ...

January 16th 2017

This session was on putting and specifically around the 4 key areas of putting 1) Starting the ball on your intended line, 2) Controlling the distance the putt rolls, 3) Reading the greens correctly and 4) Doing the first three under pressure. Their diary was updated with drills and games to teach them each component as well as each participant being given some teaching aids to assist in this learning

February 13th 2017

This session was on the golf course and we took the group out to play with the specific goal of understanding how to plan their game on each hole. This tied in nicely with session two whereby we talked about having the ability to control the curve of the ball. We also spoke about how to play when for example the shot required to get the ball close to a hole is a fade yet this is not a shot you are confident with. This was in order to maximize their ability to play to their strengths, away from their weaknesses and leave working on their weaknesses to the practice fairway.

from the ACADEMY ...

March 13th 2017

This session was with Grant Waite and he spoke to the group about expectation levels and golf not being a game that can be played perfectly. In fact golf is a game of misses in as much as everybody hits offline shots so learning that this is okay to hit bad shots and finding a way to cope with that is paramount to getting better. Grant also took up on one of our previous clinics regarding curving the ball and made a profound statement "In the history of golf no major championship, and in fact possibly no PGA tournament has ever been won by a player aiming at the flag". What does that mean??? Simply that hitting a perfectly straight shot is not only the hardest shot in golf it is also almost technically impossible.

Therefore any shot aimed at the flag and curving is moving away from the hole as opposed to a shot aimed right or left of the flag and curving back to the hole is always getting closer and as such gives you a better chance of scoring better. Grant amazed the group with his ability to predict and hit a shot curving right or left and then watched each player hit some shots and gave them all some personal advice and help.

RULES CORNER

We will this month look at the middle 6 questions in the R&A 2017 Rules of Golf quiz first posted in January. Feedback from the first 6 questions in last month's Rules Corner has been very positive – and clearly, the questions proved to be testing. It will not get any easier with this set of questions!

Most will be aware that the R&A and USGA combined Rules committees have released a draft version of the new Rules of Golf which in their final form will be adopted and come into effect from the beginning of 2019. These new rules include several major changes and will require careful study when introduced. I plan to make these proposed changes the subject of this Rules Corner contribution, over the next few months. However at this stage, we are all bound to operate under the existing Rules and the questions posed in this R&A guiz are likewise all set in accordance with the current Rules.

- 1. In stroke play, Ross's ball is at rest on the putting green. He marks, lifts and cleans the ball before replacing it, however, before he removes the ball-marker, a sudden gust of wind causes the ball to move a few inches closer to the hole. Ross replaces the ball on the original spot in front of the marker and holes the putt. What is the ruling?
- A. There is no penalty.
- B. Ross incurs a one-stroke penalty.
- C. Ross incurs a two-stroke penalty.
- 2. After a wayward tee shot, Justin's ball is still moving when it is picked up by a spectator. The spectator is quickly informed by a course marshal of the error and drops the ball approximately at the place where it was picked up. Which of the following statements is correct?
- A. Justin must play the ball as it lies from the spot where the spectator dropped the ball.
- B. Justin must replace the ball on the spot where the spectator lifted it.
- C. Justin must estimate where his ball would have come to rest had it not been picked up and drop the ball as near as possible to that spot.
- 3. Ross's ball is lying in an area of thick rough. In taking a practice swing nearby, he strikes an abandoned ball which had been buried and concealed in the thick grass. What is the ruling?
- A. Ross incurs a two-stroke penalty for playing a wrong ball.
- B. Ross incurs a two-stroke penalty for making a practice stroke during the play of a hole.
- C. There is no penalty and Ross must continue play with his original ball.



RULES CORNER Cont...

- **4.** Louis plays a very good tee shot to a par 3, but as his ball is rolling towards the hole, it deflects off J.B.'s ball which was already at rest on the green. J.B.'s ball is moved slightly closer to the hole, while the deflection causes Louis' ball to roll into the hole. Which of the following statements is correct?
- A. Louis' ball is holed in one and J.B.'s ball is played as it lies.
- B. Louis' ball is holed in one and J.B.'s ball must be replaced at its original position.
- C. Both Louis' and J.B.'s balls must be placed at the spot where they deflected
- 5. In stroke play, Ross's ball comes to rest in the rough close to the boundary of the course. He removes a stake defining the boundary which was interfering with his line of play, however, after changing his mind about the shot he wished to play, he replaces the stake to its original position before playing his next stroke back out towards the fairway. What is the ruling?
- A. There is no penalty.
- B. Ross incurs a one-stroke penalty.
- C. Ross incurs a two-stroke penalty.
- 6. Nikki is playing Ross in a match. On the 12th hole, Ross hits his tee shot out of bounds. Nikki realises Ross has played from the wrong teeing ground however she decides not to recall Ross's tee shot. Which of the following statements is true?
- A. Ross must play his 3rd shot from within the correct teeing ground and the ball may be teed.
- B. Ross must play his 3rd shot from as near as possible to where the previous stroke was made and the ball cannot be teed.
- C. Ross must play his 3rd shot from within the teeing ground from where he played his first stroke and the ball may be teed.

Rules Corner - Answers

- Question 1. C As wind is not an outside agency, Ross was required to play from the new position of the ball after it was moved by a gust of wind see Rule 18-2 and penalty statement for general breach of Rule 18. In lifting the ball from its new position, Ross incurred a 1 stroke penalty and then, by not replacing the ball to its new position, he incurred the general penalty (a total of 2 strokes) for breach of Rule 18. The fact that the ball marker was still down is irrelevant in this case.
- Question 2. C See note to Rule19-1. If a player's ball in motion has been deliberately deflected or stopped by an outside agency (the spectator in Justin's case) after a stroke from anywhere other than on the putting green, the spot where the ball would have come to rest must be estimated. In this case, as this was through the green, Justin was required to drop the ball as near as possible to that spot.
- Question 3. C See Note to Rule 7-2. A practice swing is not a practice stroke. As Ross had no intention of hitting the concealed ball in the rough, his swing was a practice swing and NOT a stroke. Thus there is no question of Ross having played either a practice stroke (Rule 7-2) or a stroke with a wrong ball (Rule 15-3).

RULES CORNER Cont..

Rules Corner - Answers

Question 4. B See Rules 19-5 and 18-5. If a ball at rest is moved by another ball in motion, the moved ball must be replaced. A ball in motion deflected by a ball at rest must be played as it lies. Thus in this case Louis' ball was considered holed and J.B.'s ball must be replaced.

Question 5. C See Rule 13-2. A player must not do anything that would improve the area of his intended swing or his line of play. One of the prohibited actions listed under Rule 13-2 is the moving of objects defining out of bounds. The moment Ross moved the OB stake, he was in breach of Rule 13-2 and there was nothing he could do to avoid the penalty. The replacement of the stake before playing his next stroke was irrelevant.

Question 6. B See Rules 11-4 and 11-5. In this case, as Nikki did not recall Ross's tee shot, (which would have required Ross to cancel the tee shot from the wrong tee and play a ball from the correct tee) Ross had in fact put a ball into play – see Definition of Ball in Play. As this ball had gone out of bounds, he was then required under Rule 27-1 to drop a ball under penalty of 1 stroke as nearly as possible at the spot from which the original ball had been played ie on the wrong teeing ground – he could not tee the ball because the original ball was not played from the correct teeing ground.


