#### MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

It is with sadness that we learned of the passing of Life Member Aileen Nash this week. I understand Aileen was quite a character and well known in golfing circles over a long period of time. She won the NZ Ladies Championship in 1954 at Miramar and represented the Club on many occasions. Retiring from international golf in 1960 did not stop her continuing to play local golf and she played silver pennants for the Club until 1992. Clearly a very talented sportswoman, Aileen also represented Manawatu at tennis, basketball, badminton and squash. Earlier this year, she was added to Sport Manawatu's Legends of Sport.

Further to last month's report with regard to the proposed development of Centennial Park the Club has lodged their submission with the PNCC as required to do so. From here, the subcommittee will be working on its presentation that they will be making to the independent Commission in August. At this stage I have nothing further to report but I can assure the members that you will be kept fully up to date with any progress that is forthcoming.

# Pro shop cont..

Tip of the Month: Wedge Game: As we all know, in winter time the course gets very wet and muddy - this puts more importance on how you strike the ball. In summer time the ground is firmer and more forgiving in terms of how the sole of the club reacts with the ground. In winter we are not so lucky - If you impact the ground just a little behind the ball then the club head will dig into the ground and take all the momentum out of the shot. This is very easy to do when the ground is soft!! Below are a few tips to get around this problem in regards to your wedge game.

#1: Do you have the right wedge for your game? Have you gone through a wedge fitting? It is very important that you have the right type of wedges for you. Everyone is different and swings the club differently so having the right type of wedges with the right type of sole and bounce for you is vital. Come see us in the shop if you have any questions regarding your current wedges.

#2: Try changing you ball position. If the ball position gets too far forward your chances of hitting the ground before the ball are high. You want the ball position ideally around the middle of your stance. But be careful you don't put it too far back as well because this can lead to hitting it thin or even more heavy (ground before ball).

#3: More weight on left side (Right handed golfer). Try having more weight on your left side at address (60% of your weight) this will help you to stay in front of the ball and get cleaner contact

It is with great sadness that we learnt Aileen Nash died on Sunday 25th June. She has been a Life Member of this club for a very long time.

# Aileen Nash – Life Member



Manawatu Golf Club life member Aileen Nash died in Palmerston North on Sunday 25<sup>th</sup> June aged 94.


Born on April 23, 1923, she was a daughter of one of Palmerston North's gentrified families and went on to play golf for New Zealand.

In February, she was anointed a Manawatu legend of sport and was presented with a plaque by Sport Manawatu at the rest home where she had lived in recent years.

Back in her day, playing golf was almost breaking the mould for women because men very much ruled. She didn't excel at Terrace End Primary School and Palmerston North Girls' High School. That didn't faze her because sport was her thing. She went on to play for Manawatu in tennis, basketball, badminton and squash.

In 1941, all of the young men had gone to war and players were in short supply at Hokowhitu. So families such as the Nashs turned to their daughters. While she hated giving up the other games she played, she grew to quickly embrace golf.

In the middle of her golfing career, someone at Hokowhitu told her father that Aileen should be writing sports, not playing. So her father brought her into the family-owned Manawatu Standard newspaper as sports editor from the late 1950s to 1968.



Aileen was set on her golfing career aged 18, a late start by these days. Considered a natural swinger of the club, she was taught the game mainly by the Manawatu club professional Jimmy Forrest and the great Andy Shaw of the Miramar Golf Club. That would have been about 1941. By 1950 she was down to a 5 handicap and won her first tournament, the Manawatu Open. Mentored by the great amateur Bessie Fullerton-Smith, Aileen was picked for Manawatu-Wanganui for her first Russell Grace interprovincial tournament in 1950. Only three years later she was wearing the silver fern and represented New Zealand from 1953.

She was angry when left out of the 1953 New Zealand team to England in favour of what she saw was a lesser player. "I had to play her at the Open at Wanganui the next year and I thrashed her."

Aileen Nash cont...

Aileen won the New Zealand Ladies Championship in 1954 in wind and rain at Miramar and yet by 1960 she had retired from international golf. She had played the first British Commonwealth tournament at St Andrew's in Scotland in 1959 where she won two singles out of three.

She played Russell Grace golf until 1965, a span of 15 seasons, and silver pennants for the club until 1992.

New Zealand players abounded at Manawatu then. There were Jean Horwell, Cath Collier (killed in a plane crash with her son), Jean Whitehead (who died in January aged 92) and Miss Nash, who out-lived them all.

When her opponents all "got too young" and assumed she was an official when she arrived at the course, she devoted herself to club golf.

We thank Aileen for her service to Golf and the Manawatu Golf Club

#### **COURSE REPORT**

We are officially in the 2<sup>nd</sup> half of the year, 2017 is flying by!

Greens are rolling smooth and consistent. Growth has slowed down as temperatures have dropped. Greens have been fertilized and also sprayed for moss control

Tees and surrounds coring is now completed. Following this, solid fertilizer has been applied to aid recovery. Tees and surrounds are healing nicely with a great cover of turf.

Fairway height has been raised slightly. Fertilizer and worm control has been applied to all. Fairways remain in good condition. Soak holes have been added to certain areas to help with drainage.

Rough is being cut when the weather allows. Please be aware of any wet areas around, we barrier as many as we can without interruption.

3<sup>rd</sup> tee is being re-turfed and leveled as well as shaped for the better

Golf Cart Rules and Etiquette

The club rules and etiquette on golf carts are there for health and safety and also to protect our course.

Please remember to keep away from tee boxes and 10 meters away from the greens. Keep away from bunkers



to avoid damage. Stay on paths where available. Please avoid driving through wet or muddy areas.

Please continue to repair pitchmarks and replace divots. Please use the starting tees on the day (usually 1st and 10th). Too many people are using the 3rd and 13th and it disrupts the course work.



#### **RULES CORNER**

As reported in the first newsletter this year, the MGC is to post the Local Rule which removes any penalty when a ball is accidentally moved if on a putting green. For clarification of this Local Rule, I am re-presenting the background information and details of how this Local Rule will operate.

The proposed new Local Rule modifies Rule 18-2 by providing that there is **no penalty** if a player **accidentally causes his/her ball on the putting green to move**. For consistency, this Local Rule also modifies Rule 18-3 to eliminate the similar penalty in match play when an opponent accidentally causes the player's ball on the putting green to move.

As a related issue, this Local Rule also modifies Rule 20-1 by providing that there is no penalty if a player or opponent accidentally causes the player's ball-marker on the putting green to move.

The New Local Rule will read as follows:

"Accidental Movement of a Ball on a Putting Green"

Rules 18-2, 18-3 and 20-1 are modified as follows:

When a player's ball lies on the putting green, there is no penalty if the ball or ball-marker is accidentally moved by the player, partner, opponent, or any of their caddies or equipment. The moved ball or ball-marker must be replaced as provided in Rules 18-2, 18-3 and 20-1.

This Local Rule applies only when the player's ball or ball-marker lies on the putting green and any movement is accidental.

Note: If it is determined that a player's ball on the putting green was moved as a result of wind, water or some other natural cause such as the effects of gravity, the ball must be played as it lies from its new location. A ball-marker moved in such circumstances is replaced."

It is important for golfers to realise that this is a Local Rule and while it will almost certainly be in effect for major NZGA and local District events, it may not be adopted by all clubs – making it the player's responsibility to carefully check local rules applicable when playing in competitions on other courses.

Also note the Local Rule only applies to accidental movement of a ball on the putting green – if a player causes his/her ball to move when it is lying through the green the penalt(y)s under Rule 18-2 apply.



# **RULES CORNER**

The new Local Rule does not apply to a ball on the putting green moved by the wind, water or any other natural cause – in these situations the ball must be played as it lies from its new location without penalty.

# Examples of how the new Local Rule will work.

- When preparing to play a stroke, a player accidentally cause his/her ball to move (eg, practice strokes near the ball, addressing the ball, accidentally moving the ball with putter other than during a stroke at the ball) No penalty and the ball must be replaced
- 2. A player accidentally drops ball which hits and causes ball-marker to move **No penalty** and ball-marker must be replaced
- 3. A player accidentally drops umbrella which hits and causes ball to move No penalty and ball must be replaced
- 4. A player accidentally kicks ball No penalty and ball must be replaced

# Examples when the new Local Rule would NOT apply.

- 1. A player accidentally causes his/her ball to move that is lying through the green 1 stroke penalty and ball must be replaced
- 2. A player intentionally moves, rotates or lifts ball on the putting green without first marking its location 1 stroke penalty and ball must be replaced


Members are directed to read the details of this new Local Rule as posted as an additional Local Rule on the Local Rules noticeboard(s) adjacent to the card room.

I would also like to draw our members attention to a Golf Rules day to be run by Helen Dickens and scheduled for July 16 at the Palmerston North Golf Club. Helen is a very well qualified Golf Rules administrator and does an excellent job in presenting seminars on Golf Rules. The day will include a "classroom" session in the morning (about 2 hours) followed by a practical "on course" series of practical situations covering golf rules. I highly recommend this day to all interested in furthering their understanding of the Rules of Golf.
