MESSAGE FROM THE GENERAL MANAGER

Having only officially completed 4 Wednesday's in the GM role, it may seem premature to share a GM's report with the members. Rather than a report, this is more of an update on the first month and sharing important progress the team has made in June.

I have had the opportunity to meet and enjoy engagement with our 9 hole group, our Wednesday 18 holers, our Saturday 18 holers and our Business House golfers. I have been overwhelmed by the warm and generous welcome extended and am looking forward to building relationships with these and all other membership groups over the next few months.

The welcome from staff has also been very warm and friendly. It is not too much of a cliche to say that our staff are indeed our greatest asset and I have been so impressed by their level of commitment and professionalism. I have really been amazed at the impact and the level of involvement of volunteers in our club and I have become increasingly aware of their importance to the successful functioning of almost all parts of MGC operation.

The number of hours the committee gives and the support they offer is quite humbling for me and for all MGC staff. Outside of the committee there is a large group of volunteers who also make a great contribution to the success of the club - both in an official and unofficial capacity. I look forward to working with these people and showing my and the club's appreciation to them as I become more familiar with what they do.

Updates

Greenkeepers: Scott Hamilton, from Hamilton, will join the Greenkeepers team on August 1st. Scott completed his Greenkeepers qualifications at North Shore Golf Club and impressed both Kiel and I in a two stage interview process. Scott is moving to Feilding with his partner over the next 3-4 weeks.

Events and Marketing Manager: Rachel is a huge loss to MGC, but this presents a great opportunity for someone to join this team. We had 20+ applicants for the Events and Marketing role. The stand out candidate was Hayley Underwood. Hayley is currently working at Netball Manawatu and has also had recent success with the Manawatu Lawn Tennis Club. Our selection criteria included the ability to perform the Events, Marketing and Communications roles and most importantly the ability to work with the existing team both in the office and with the Cafe. Not part of the selection criteria, but perhaps something of high interest is the fact that Hayley is an amazing endurance swimmer who last year swam the length of Lake Taupo - 42 km - in 14 hours! Hayley's start date is July 25th and we are very grateful that Hayley will be able to spend some time with Rachel before she finishes. We plan for Hayley to take on a greater Marketing and Comms role (including increasing our Social Media presence) and for some of the existing internal golf event management to be taken on by Christine Rose - specifically the Super 6s and Manawatu Open.

Speaking of the Super 6's they return to the Manawatu Golf Club next year and the proposed date is Feb 16-19, 2023. We look forward to a massive MGC volunteer team delivering another outstanding event.

Course: I'm enjoying working with Kiel and over the last 3 weeks we have identified our course priorities. The immediate focuses for the Course team are:

- Short term solution to the drainage problems and bunker on hole 16. (Work started last week)
- Share a long term plan and solution for all bunkers on the course, prioritising those most in need of work.
- Present a plan to the course committee for work on the area between the 6th tee and 7th fairway where trees were removed.
- Planting of native trees along the 15th hole
- A short term solution for the paths (lime) which will allow us time to make a decision and present a plan on resurfacing our pathways.

Priorities for me in the GM role:

- Developing a working knowledge of the GM role at MGC and continuing to build relationships with members and all stakeholders.
- Sponsorship plan and engagement with sponsors
- Earning trust and building relationships with the staff
- Supporting Kiel to build the Greenkeepers team with one new team member and one more likely addition to the team in the near future.
- Onboarding the new Events and Marketing person with an immediate focus on upcoming events and increasing our presence via social media
- Ensuring their are visible signs of development on the course with a specific focus on bunkers, Hole 6/7, planting around hole 15 and paths
- Exploring tee booking opportunities to ensure equitable access to all members
- Engagement with Rangitāne and working through the process of renewing water bore access
- Attending the Golf Course Managers conference in Chch in early August
- Coordinate a members and friends working bee in July to help with the 'liming' of the paths thanks in advance if you are able to help (more details to come asap)

The above is a brief summary of my first month in the role - in a part time capacity. I can't wait to come on board in a full time role from July 25th and I am very excited about the opportunities the General Manager's role presents. I am confident, with the excellent team of staff and volunteers who surround me, that we definitely can achieve our goal of being a Golf Club that members are proud of and enjoy belonging to.

From all here in the Golf Shop, we would like to say farewell and a big thank you to Rachel for all her hard work and for being such an awesome team member over the last five years! All the best for your future endeavours!!!!

Interesting Golf News in June:

- 1. Did you know that 2022 US Open Champion Matthew Fitzpatrick records every shot he hits on the course on his note pad! That takes some serious commitment. He has charted every single golf shot he has hit since he was 15 years old. For example: say he's 165 yards out and hitting an 8 iron, but he wants to land it 161 yards, 8 yards left of the flag. If he hits it 165 and it lands in the hole, he'll chart that as a 4-yard miss on distance and 8 yards on line. This gives him way more accurate data than ShotLink because he's measuring vs his target, not where the hole is.
- 2. Lydia Ko brings up her 100th top 10 in 210 starts with 17 victories. To put that into context, Jordan Spieth has played 232 events on the PGA Tour had 77 top 10s and 13 victories.
- 3. All aboard the Liv Golf money train: You would have to be living in another galaxy to not have heard or read about LIV Golf this past month. The latest players supposedly to join will be Matt Wolf and Eugenio Chacarra (#2 ranked men's amateur golfer in the world). What's most interesting is that the DP World Tour (Formally the European Tour) has only banned LIV Golf Players from playing in their co-sanctioned events on the PGA Tour. Only 3 events.

This will be interesting to follow because you may find the LIV Golf players, such as DJ and co, signing up to the DP World Tour to get world ranking points and to qualify for the Majors & WGC events if needed. The DP World Tour could be the big winner in all of this, maybe???

4. Congratulations Tara Raj: Tara won her first offshore-event on Tuesday, winning the Adidas Junior 6's event at Cromer Golf Club in Sydney by one shot.





Newsletter Golfing Tip: How do you play out of wet compact sand???? We get this question a lot in the shop and while coaching. There are two different things you must do when the sand is wet and more compact than usual:

1. Don't open or add loft to the clubface as much at address. What does this mean? This will allow the club to dig into the sand (yes, I know this sounds counterintuitive as we are always told in bunkers, "open the face and let the bounce of the club work so the club doesn't dig into the sand to much". Well, if we do open the clubface like normal, the club will bounce off the hard sand and the ball will either cannon into the lip of the bunker or cannon over the green! You won't have the same height on the shot but you will get the ball out and on the green! See pictures below - one is set up for a normal soft sand bunker shot with clubface open/more loft. The other is for wet/compact sand clubface set at a normal address position.





2. Impact closer to the ball: Because the sand is firmer we need to impact the sand closer to the ball. Think 1 inch behind the ball is what we need to do!!! See picture lines indicate where you want to enter the into the sand. Black = normal/fluffy sand, Green = when sand is compacted.

From the Match policy Document

I have had it mentioned to me about the lack of etiquette on the golf course from golfers of various abilities. It must be remembered that good manners and etiquette are an important part of playing golf to make the golfing experience pleasurable for all members on the course.



So I have attached below a section from the Match Committee Policy Document.

Please take a moment to read it.

Golf Etiquette

The Match committee is expected to encourage following of appropriate golfing etiquette.

- Start from the correct tee at the appropriate time
- Keep up with the group in front, not just ahead of the group behind. If you are unable to do this, stand back for a few minutes and allow the group following to come through.
- Repair pitch marks on greens.
- Replace divots firmly on fairways.
- · Rake bunkers and replace the rake outside of the bunker
- Abide by the Club's dress code standards.

If a player consistently disregards these guidelines during a round or over a period of time to the detriment of others, it is recommended that the Committee considers taking appropriate disciplinary action against the offending player.

COURSE REPORT

Halfway through 2022 already, the year is flying by as the world keeps on changing. Seeing so many people using the facilities at Manawatu Golf Club is great to see (a). Welcome aboard to James Lovegrove. Over the past few Wednesdays having worked with James, I must say that James adds a spring to our step with a positive can-do attitude as well as huge motivation, we as a club are looking forward to the coming years. In the last month we have started work on the 16th hole. This is to repair the bunker & to try dry up the surround. Progress is moving along well, I understand it is taking its time, we are just a couple of staff down. We will continue to complete the drain, once the drain is filled to the top we will then work on the bunker. We will lay turf closer to the end of July to allow the drain to work, or to fix anything we need to.

We are close to replacing staff that have left, this will help us get more tasks completed. I want to say thank you to many of the volunteers who put their hands up and help on the course and elsewhere in the club. This work is invaluable to us as staff members and members who love playing the course.

In the next month we will have the 16th finished and in play, paths will be topped up with lime and wewill start the bunkers. Bunkers are a huge part of our maintenance every week, when you are staff down, we try to prioritise what is important. With the rainfall we had early June it is hard to beautify the bunkers, you can't fluff up the sand. With the stones in the bunkers, we need to sieve these out. If anyone out there has and old bed base with the spring, they act as a good sieve, sing out if we can grab it to make a sieve out of it.

Just a few things we are seeing around the course, scuff marks around the hole, please be aware when the weather is damp, when you twist or scuff your shoes they mark the ground and the person behind you must putt through this. Divots on the Tees, with the cold weather we don't have the growth for recovery, the Par 3 tees are quite bad. When playing the Par 3's, can you please not have a practice swing, this is to stop as many divots. We also see damage on the greens from a club been slammed into the green or a little divot taken out, please be aware that it affects everyone. Please continue to repair pitch marks and replace your divots (3), we do appreciate this. Continue to watch where you walk your trundlers and drive your carts also, please (3).

Wish all members and visitors well in the coming month of golf ③.

Rules Corner

I am regularly approached by members requesting a ruling on a particular Rules situation that they have encountered during regular play. This month I will look at one that I was recently asked.

"What are the consequences of hitting the ball when having a practice swing? Are there any penalties that may apply?"

The answer to this depends on where (which area of the course) this event occurs. Thus I will cover Rules that apply if this occurs in the teeing area, the general area, in bunkers and penalty areas and finally on the putting green.

The teeing area

If a player accidentally hits the ball while having a practice swing in the teeing area there is NO PENALTY and the practice swing that caused the ball to move is NOT counted as a stroke. The player has not put a ball in play (has not made a stroke at a ball from the teeing area – see definition of a stroke). The player must start over by playing a ball from within the teeing area which will be the player's first stroke on that hole. Note: if the ball remains in the teeing area after being hit during a practice swing, the player may lift and re-tee the ball anywhere within the teeing area. For more information on this, members are advised to read Rule 6.1 and 6.2.

The General Area, Bunkers and Penalty areas

A ball at rest in any of these areas of the course is in play. Under Rule 9, if it is known or virtually certain that the player is responsible for the movement of a ball at rest in any of these areas, the player incurs a 1 stroke penalty. Accidentally hitting a ball during a practice swing clearly demonstrates that the player caused the ball to move. The player must replace the ball on its original spot (which if not known must be estimated). Failure to replace the ball on its original spot and playing the ball from its position at rest after being hit by practice swing incurs the general penalty (2 strokes in stroke play, loss of hole in match play). Note: none of the 4 exceptions listed in Rule 9.4b (that avoid penalty for a player causing the ball to move) apply in the case of a ball moved as a result of a practice swing. Members are advised to revise Rules 9.4a and 9.4b for more information on this topic.

The Putting Green

There is still some confusion among players (and even commentators covering major golf events worldwide) regarding the consequences of actions by a player which may cause a ball to move on the putting green. Under the new Rules effective since 2019, there is now NO PENALTY if a player ACCIDENTALLY causes the ball to move on the putting green. The movement of a ball by a practice putting stroke near the ball at rest on the putting green is deemed accidental. If the ball is moved by a practice putting stroke, there is NO PENALTY and the player must replace the ball on its original spot. Members are directed to Rules 9.4 Exception 3, and 13.1d for more information on this topic.

Members should note that in this discussion I have concentrated solely on the issue of a ball moved by a practice swing in the various areas of the course. Clearly there are many more situations where a ball at rest may move and a range of causes and possible penalties that might apply, that must be identified when this happens. I highly recommend members read the full versions of Rules 9 and 13 to assist the understanding of this important Rules of Golf section.
